know, I would—I would basically be get beat up by, by themselves, by Deputy Neu.

That's what he told me. And he told me he was gonna mace me and cuff me if I didn't, if I didn't comply with what he wanted.

Q: And what happened at that point?

Uh, I told him I didn't want to fight. Then he told me what would happen if I didn't fight, which was beating me up, cuffing me, and macing me. So then after—after realizing I, I didn't want to get that treatment, then—hold on one second. (Pause.) Sorry. Somebody was here. But, oh, yeah, if I didn't comply with that, then I would get rolled up and, and, uh, took—basically took to main line or San Bruno, basically.

Q: Okay. Um, so—

A: I ended up did, uh fighting. I ended up fighting Stanley on the first day, and basically he—what he told me was this is where medic—this is medical right here. You guys—if you guys—if you guys go to medical—if you end up going to medical, you gotta say you fell off the bunk and none—that basically none of this happened. And he told me anything goes. Just don't punch in the face so—so no one can basically see the marks. But anything goes other than the face.

Q: What happened in the first fight?

A: The first fight we were fighting, tussling, wrestling, and punching each other up until I got Stanley into a headlock, and then he eventually tapped out, which—which led the fight to stop. And then we got up, and I walked from the end of the hallway where there was kind of a blind spot but still visible from the whole hallway and went back to the—went back to our pod area.

Q: Okay. And was there any betting that was going on that you could tell?

A: Yes. When—when I got up from the fight and Stanley got up, too, Deputy Neu told (inaudible).

Q: Can you repeat that again? I can't hear you.

A: When I got up from the fight with Stanley, after getting up off the floor, Deputy Neu told

Stanley that he would be coming on Saturday, the following day, to take him to work out and to, to, to basically train him. And he also told everyone that was there that there will be a Round 2 and he does not like to lose money.

- Q: And so what happened, uh—
- A: Which—which I believe he was betting on the fight because he, uh, Stanley lost.
- Q: Okay. And was—was one of, either you or Stanley, uh, represented by one of the deputies? In other words, were you, um, fighting for one of the deputies in particular?
- A: Yes. The following day, which led to a second fight, um, Jones (inaudible)—
- Q: Okay. You have to keep your voice up. I can't hear it.
- A: Basically Jones told me that—that he was counting on me and do not let him down, and then Deputy Neu kept repeating and saying do you—you're gonna fight my champion second round. Second round's going down on Saturday. It's going down on Saturday. You gotta—you're gonna—it's gonna be Round 2. And then, which made me believe, okay, that Deputy Neu is fighting—or Deputy Neu is his—the person that's under him was Stanley. And Jones, I was under Jones, 'cause Jones told me good luck and I missed it yesterday and I'm counting on you today.
- Q: Okay. And so tell—tell us about the second fight. What happened?
- A: Well, the second fight happened when we were all in the kitchen and he came and he made—he was making Stanley do push-ups in the hallway. And then he told him, all right, well, we're gonna go to the big boy. You're gonna do—you're gonna do some pull-ups. Well, a lot of people was laughing at—laughing at him that he couldn't do it, and Deputy Neu, he singled me out and said, oh, you're laughing. Well, you're gonna fight him now. There's gonna be a Round 2. Then I told him I didn't want to fight, joking around saying that he doesn't pay up, because he made us fight over a burger. The winner gets a burger. I told him that he didn't pay up from the previous fight. I did not want to—I didn't want to fight. So then I then went to the kitchen and tried to avoid him 'cause I really didn't even want to fight. I was (inaudible) I was scared of doing it again. And when I went inside the

kitchen, Deputy Jones came and said, come on, little man. Neu has your burger, and I'm counting on you. I can't—basically, I can't—you know what I mean, don't let me down. Like I can't have you just not do it. I said, you know, I don't really—I don't want to.

And then the inmate, Jonathan Christopher, came and told me Neu was looking for me. He was walking up the hallway, couldn't find me. He has the burgers, and he was trying to give it to me and make me fight again. And then he—I told him I didn't want to. So that inmate left. Then after that, Neu walked up, maybe about a minute later, and told me, come on. Let's go to the back because it's Round 2, and if you don't do it, then basically I'm gonna fuck you up—or F you up. Sorry about that. And, and handcuff you and mace you, and you're going back—you're gonna go to the main line or Bruno.

So then I—then I walked from the kitchen to where the fighting area took place the first day, and Stanley was already waiting there, and they told us the same rules apply, no hits on the face, and then we started fighting, started tussling. I ended up getting hit in the private area. I tried to tell him to stop. They wouldn't let us stop. He told me—then he told me to hit him back in the private area to make it even, and then punch him, and then—then the fight took a pause because (inaudible) Aquino and Collins came and seen it and started to run down the hallway. I don't know for what reason, to stop or what, but they ran halfway down the hallway and then stopped, uh, because they weren't really signaling for them to—like, the Deputy Neu and Jones were signaling for them to stop and go back. So then they—I seen the look on their face. They were kinda confused, so they turned around and started walking back towards (inaudible). Then after that, they separated us. They made us get back on our feet. Then they made us go at it again with—then the fight led to us being in—being in a headlock on the floor, and then they told us to stop and said you guys are both the winners. And then they, they made us go back to the kitchen.

- Q: Have you been injured in any of these fights?
- A: Yes. I have bruises on my back, on my elbows, and also my—my ribs still feel like—like I may be fractured. I'm not—I don't think it's broken but I think it's fractured because like I

1		have a hard time breathing still, and I can't sleep on the right side of my, my, my body.
2		And this occurred like in the beginning, the beginning of this month, and now like I believe
3		it's about, what, three weeks later and I'm still witnessing pain.
4	Q:	Did you want to fight?
5	A:	No, I did not want to fight in either fights. I was really trying to get out of it each time and
6		I couldn't.
7	Q:	Why, why did you fight?
8	A:	'Cause I was scared that, you know, the deputies were gonna basically cuff me (inaudible).
9	Q:	Oh, could you repeat that again? Your voice cut out.
10	A:	'Cause I was scared the deputies was gonna cuff me and beat me.
11	Q:	And did the deputies threaten you?
12	A:	Yes.
13	Q:	And how many deputies threatened you?
14	A:	Um, the only one that threatened me was Neu.
15	Q:	Okay. And does Deputy Neu work for the Sheriff's Department?
16	A:	Yes, he does, along with Jones and Chiba and Staehly. And him and Jones are—I, I feel
17		like they're in cahoots with each other because even after those days, really before, I feel
18		like they were bullying me. They would come and rip open my mattress, try to look for
19		reasons to, you know, get me in trouble. I feel like they're trying to stir like a racial,
20		something racial going on because I'm the only one of Asian descent in, in the
21	Q:	The—the other people that are involved in these fights, um, what—what nationality or
22		ethnicity are they?
23	A:	African-American.
24	Q:	Okay. And you are, um—what's your ethnicity?
25	A:	I'm Hawaiian and Filipino.
26	Q:	And do you feel that this has something to do with your ethnicity?
27	A:	Yes, I do, and it like—and if—if it didn't, I feel like they're just trying to stir something up,

1		you know, inside of the pod area to where I would get turned on from the African-
2		Americans where they would get on me, basically beat me up.
3	Q:	And the Deputy Neu and Deputy Jones, what nationality are they?
4	A:	They are Caucasian, white.
5	Q:	Okay. Um, were there any other deputies who were present during these fights?
6	A:	Other than the ones I've stated, no.
7	Q:	Other than Deputy Neu and Deputy Jones, were there any other deputies?
8	A:	Yes. Yes.
9	Q:	Who else?
10	A:	Deputy Chiba and Deputy Staehly.
11	Q:	Okay. Were there any other deputies that saw what happened or came by when—when it
12		was going on?
13	A:	Um, no, that I am aware of. I just know that there was two bailiffs.
14	Q:	And do you recall—
15	A:	Plus, I had seen them.
16	Q:	Do you recall who they were?
17	A:	Yes.
18	Q:	And what were their names?
19	A:	Bailiff Aquino and Bailiff Collins.
20	Q:	Okay. And how were these two bailiffs involved?
21	A:	They were walking by in the hallway (inaudible). I believe they were coming from court
22		going towards (inaudible) and they walked by the door, and by the door you can see down
23		the hallway. And that's when they seen, you know, the fight going on.
24	Q:	And how do you feel about what happened to you?
25	A:	Basically, I feel scared for my life. You know what I mean? I don't know when they're
26		gonna come and, you know, try to basically attack or anything. You know what I mean?
27		I'm kind of just walking on egg shells.

- Q: Is there another fight planned as far as you know?
- A: Um, no, but they keep sending subliminals and telling me that there is gonna be a Round 3, and, and they told me today that—that he was training Stanley Harris and for me to be ready for, for the next round.
- Q: Did they say when the next fight was gonna be?
- A: Um, not the exact date, but they said that there was going to be one.
- Q: How do you feel about this next fight?
- A: Yeah, I'm scared, bro, 'cause, you know, I have a injury from the last two and I don't even want to do it to begin with. I just really just want to do my time and, and get out of here.

 You know what I mean? And I feel like this is (phone cut off-inaudible) because I have to wake up in fear that, you know, the people that's supposed to protect me is, is out to get me.
- Q: And does—do the deputies force you to gamble as well?
- A: Yes, for food, (inaudible). They knocked over my trays of food before. They—the—you know, when I work extra in the kitchen and, you know, staff wants to reward me and give me maybe a burger or a salad, if I come back with it or any change of clothes, you know, Deputy Neu, he makes me gamble. He'll—I told him I did not know how to play Black Jack, which is 21, because that's what he would try to (inaudible) gamble, and he would tell me to pick a card, whichever high card wins, and if I lose, that he would take my food, which he did take my food plenty of times, and he would—he would basically take it and tell me that, you know, if I won, I'd be able to keep it and go inside the dorm or he would—he would make Stanley do push-ups for whatever we have. Say we have a (inaudible) trying to come back, and this is all stuff that we're supposed to be allowed to have and receive and bring back to, you know what I mean, our pod area.
- Q: This gambling, um, why does—why does he do this?
- A: Um...
- Q: Why does Deputy Neu do this?

stay in the kitchen area so to make my time go by faster, you know, and plus there's little
